 - Labor market activity
 - Working conditions
 - Price changes in the economy
- Mission: Collect, analyze, and disseminate essential economic information to support public and private decision-making
- Serve diverse user communities by providing products and services that are accurate, objective, relevant, timely and accessible



How Are We Doing?





Since Last Year...

■ Unemployment rate 3.5% to 7.9%



- Employment down 10,735,000 (-6.8%)
- Labor force down 3,908,000 (-2.4%)



- Wages and Salaries up 2.9%
- Consumer prices up 1.3%





The Employment Situation's two headline indicators


- Two independent perspectives

 - ► More complete picture—employers <u>and</u> employees



Impact of the Coronavirus (COVID-19) on the Labor Market




Alternative measures of labor underutilization

Civilian unemployment rate Seasonally adjusted, 2006–2020



Civilian labor force participation rate



Number of people not in the labor force who did not look for work because of the coronavirus pandemic Not seasonally adjusted, 2020



Percent of employed people who teleworked because of the coronavirus pandemic Not seasonally adjusted, 2020



People who were unable to work or worked fewer hours because of the coronavirus pandemic Not seasonally adjusted, 2020




Unemployment rates by state, seasonally adjusted, August 2020












Employment changes by industry sector






States that are within 5% of February employment levels





Number of Unemployed Persons Per Job Opening






What has been happening to Prices and Wages?






Over-the-year Consumer Price changes and Private Wages and Salaries




Food price changes






Price Changes for select components in Food at Home
