State and Local Outlook

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Summary

- Professional Services will **lead** the regional economy; however, growth will be **limited** until production workers are reengaged.
- Although businesses have already shifted to more contingent labor, the workforce mindset will still need to adjust to this new reality.
- Increased costs nationally and the slow regional economy may impact some companies in the coming year.
- Consumers are regaining their strength (employment and wages); however, they remain slightly over leveraged and have little cushion for another downturn.
- Provided consistent positive news, aerospace should see some limited employment growth within the next two years.
- Employment is expected to increase by 1.5%, which would be an improvement over 2014; however, it is still below potential.



Wichita - Income and Earnings





Annual Wage (2008 Base Year)



Summary

 Although the U.S. has seen overall real growth in wages, most income classes have experienced real income losses over the last few years.

 The inflation adjusted average annual wage in Kansas has increased by about 2% over the last six years.

 The excess labor supply and weak regional economy are reflected in the lower relative increased real wages in Wichita.









 High skilled production workers are working more hours to make up for weak growth in wages.

- An annual industry wage may not reflect the total wage income of households.









Summary

- Nonfarm proprietors' income has grown faster at the state level, but slower within the Wichita market.
- Work ethic and skilled labor remain a backbone for Kansas, which is revealed in manufacturing hours worked and workers holding more than one job.
- Relative total employment growth remains weak, which is putting downward pressure on wages.
- The shortage of workers in key occupations in professional services will hamper further growth.





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Future Expectations



 Optimism has increased, which will spill over to more positive labor market conditions in 2016.










Goods Producing - Wichita

 Kansas oil production declined in the first half of 2015 due to low oil prices.

 Construction labor market continues to improve.

 Profit margins are improving in aerospace and defense sector because of efficiency and improvements within the supply chain.






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Retail Sales and Wages - Wichita

 Small real increases in wages at the state level will help push retail sales up, despite low consumer sentiment.

 Slow employment growth along with weak wage growth will dampen Wichita's retail sales.


 Tightening labor slack is driving overall wages; however, manufacturing wages remain weak.







Trade, Transportation and Utilities - Wichita



 Strong retail employment growth is not expected, because of uncertainty within the state and changing consumer demands.


 Transportation continues to maintain consistent growth year over year.

 Utilities has had mixed growth due to low energy costs and changing preferences.



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Services - Wichita



- Although professional services have continued to be a leading growth sector, growth has been slightly dampened by limited supply of labor.
- Growth in health services employment is matching the aging population; however, the changing market forces and increased competitive landscape will have lasting effects on this industry.
- Financial services growth is waiting on the overall growth to catch up.




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Government Employment - Wichita

- Discretionary decision making at the local level could impact employment beyond budgeted expectations.
- The decreased 2016 state budget will marginally impact state employment.
- Based on the 2016 budgets, overall employment is expected to remain almost flat.

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Summary - Kansas and Wichita

- Real average wages are expected to increase across Kansas; however, consumption will remain muted until labor demanded increases for moderate skilled workers and uncertainty dissipates.
- Increased business optimism, business profits, and an improving market place should make the next 18 months prime for investments across the state.
- Improvements in the global market place is critical for the health of the aerospace sector and employment growth.
- The sustained low costs in the oil could have some delayed and unidentified negative effects in Kansas.
- Employment is expected to increase 1.4% in Kansas and 1.1% in Wichita, which reflects a slow growth economy compared to the Nation.
